In just a short couple of months, they have created a Facebook page, produced a regular newsletter and organized several educational & social events and applied for another grant to further enhance their network. 2022 COMPLIANCE REVIEW – CONDUCTED BY MINISTRY

The Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services conducted their annual compliance review at Community Living Glengarry from April 19 - 22, 2022. Compliance inspections are intended to provide assurances to the Ministry, members of the public, stakeholders and individuals receiving services and supports that adults with developmental disabilities are receiving quality standards of care, in a safe and secure environment. In a normal operating year, organizations are rated on 280 indicators, however, during covid-19, organizations are rated on 79 indicators plus MCCSS uses a covid checklist to ensure that organizations are following practices and the recommendations of Ministry of Health to ensure the safety and well being of individuals supported by the organization. During the review CLG met all indicators except 2, which were scored as non-compliant. Corrective action was immediately performed. CLG received a letter of compliance, which is posted on the agency website and in the front lobby at the Community Network Centre.

At the Bishop residence we value independence, teamwork and kindness above all else. Our home has seven people supported: **Peter, Michel, Manon, Barb,** and **Lyne** are in the main living area while **David** and **Nina** have their own separate apartments.

Michel is very independent and enjoys going for walks by himself. He will regularly take train trips to Montreal to visit his family by himself and enjoys going shopping at stores around Alexandria. Manon has a very lighthearted personality. Manon enjoys playing bingo, bowling, cards, and is an avid artist when it comes to arts and crafts and drawings. Manon is always looking forward to try new opportunities to grow and enhance her independence and creativity.

Barb is very funny and friendly. Notably a huge Habs fan, Barb prefers to wear and use products and clothing related to the Habs. She has paid employment for one hour a week. She enjoys going to Glen's hockey games, visiting the farm to pet some animals and bowling. Barb greatly enjoyed the opportunity going by limo to attend a Laval Rockets hockey game.

Lyne was welcomed into our home this year. Her interests include going out to get drinks with her friends, playing bingo in Cornwall and going to the GIAG Outreach program. She goes to the Community Network Centre to participate in a painting class; her painting was displayed in the community art show hosted by the Glengarry Artists' Collective.

David lives in his own apartment and enjoys his time living independently. He enjoys having conversations about his passion for automobiles. He is really close to his family. One of David's main goals this past year was to attend a family member's wedding in Oakville. Needless to say he was pretty ecstatic to have an overnight trip making it to this special event. David was also elected this year to the Board of Directors for our organization.

Nina prides herself that she is living independently, which was one of her Mom's wishes for her. She enjoys going to the Outreach Program to participate in their activities. She gets together regularly with her sister Mary-Lou to have dinner and spend quality time. Nina was thrilled to finally visit her brother's cottage in Magog, Quebec this past summer. This trip previously had been put on hold for a couple years due to covid.

She worked with Tom to help create the groundwork of his Westport trips and reestablish his natural support connections. These continue to be a favourite visit to this day. Beginning this May, Ann will once again be accompanying Tom to Westport that she started with him years ago.

For people that know Tom well, you are fully aware that Tom has well-developed twangy vocals that is instinctive and natural. His definitive Country sound has captured the imagination of many and so much so that a local band is eager to give Tom a one-on-one opportunity to practice with their band. The full details are not quite clear yet, but Tom has already requested that the band, the County Lads play at his 80th Birthday Party next year.

I cannot speculate of the other plans that are in store for the other people who call West Boundary home, but you can be certain that their planning for new experiences and opportunities will be focused on the importance of connecting where they are valued and respected with inclusion in their community and beyond.

COMMUNITY LIVING MONTH

Community Living Month "May" is a province-wide annual awareness campaign to promote true inclusion for people who have an intellectual disability and their families. To promote Community Living Month we encouraged the community to help us raise awareness and celebrate with us. "Inclusion" signs were posted throughout the county of Glengarry and a "Shine the Light on Community Living" contest was held where people were asked to share photos on Facebook showing their building's exterior lights were blue and green. In support of our business community, we delivered green & blue frosted cupcakes each week during the month of May to various businesses. We spent a weekend at our local Your Independent Grocers where we held a bbq and bagged groceries, inserting inclusion flyers into the bags. EMPLOYMENT SUPPORTS

The Employment Supports program provides services to 22 people and employs 1.5 full time support workers. The program provides assistance to people in resume writing, finding jobs, coaching, transportation to and from jobs, and checking in once employment has been found. The program also offers support to people to attend the employment courses offered through GIAG. We also provide volunteer opportunities for people that help them to develop the skills they will need to secure a job in the future.

Of the 22 people we support, 9 people are employed in various jobs in the community; 5 people are employed doing cleaning for CLG, 3 people are in volunteer positions, and 1 person is on the waiting list for the GIAG employment course. Unfortunately, 3 people lost their jobs due to the pandemic and we are currently looking for job opportunities for them.

SUPPORTED INDEPENDENT LIVING

The SIL program currently assists 18 people to live independently or semi-independently in the community.

We provide guidance and support for people based on assessed needs and their personal individual support plan which can range from participating in community activities, maintain personal and family relationships, meal preparation, money management, landlord-tenant negotiations and assistance with appointments and accessing other community resources.

We focus on quality of life and assisting people in achieving their personal goals and dreams.





FUNDRAISING – A YEAR IN REVIEW

Community Living Glengarry has had the support of Glengarry and surrounding areas with our Fundraising initiatives.

We have held many annual events such as our Lobster Fest our Ted Orwell Memorial Summer Classic Golf Tournament, we also held a Christmas Concert along with an Ottawa Senator's Raffle and our annual \$10,000 Draw. Community Living bingos have taken place every Wednesday at the Cornwall Bingo Centre.

Community Living Glengarry receives a wide range of support such as donation of items and sponsors for events as well as the community's attendance at our events. Fundraising would not be made possible without the support of community partners and the generosity of people attending and supporting our fundraising.

As we close off this year, we look forward to our next year of fundraising events with hopes of returning to more in person events and continuing to collaborate with our Community Partners.



INFRASTRUCTURE & FUNDING

Community Living Glengarry was successful in obtaining funding for a couple of our homes. The Bishop residence received additional funding for the renovations that started at the end of 2021-2022 as additional costs incurred for the kitchen renovations. Bishop also replaced the ventilation and UV light purification system.

Dominion had the floors in both bathrooms removed and a new floor installed. Each bathroom was also renovated to make it more accessible. The Arjo bathtub was replaced with a new one as parts for the previous Arjo bathtub were becoming obsolete.

Roy Crescent received funding for replacing their water tank and installing an iron removal system.
